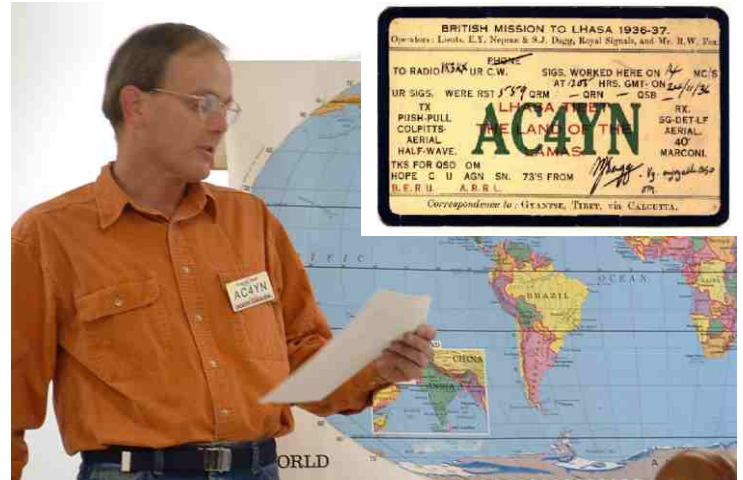

Jeff Stafford AC4YN

At FARC Feb meeting Jeff talks about Tibet & the original AC4YN

At the FARC February meeting Jeff Stafford presented the history of AC4YN; Jeff is the third holder of that call. Jeff received the call when he upgraded as it was assigned in order - it was not a vanity call. It's early history goes back to pre WWII Tibet.

In 1936 Colonel Sir Evan Yorke Nepean was part of the British political expedition to Tibet. While in Tibet he took the AC4 prefix (then assigned to Tibet) and YN, being two of his initials, for the suffix. After WWII the AA- AZ prefixes were transferred to the USA.

In 1936 there were few places in the world as remote as Tibet. A telegraph wire made of a single strand of galvanized iron had been ran to Lhasa, but it was undependable. Although Tibet eventually came under Chinese control in 1950, the wireless at Lhasa enabled Tibet to receive news from sources other than the Chinese wireless prior to WWII.

Later Reginald Fox used the same call AC4YN when he operated from Tibet. Fox was hired by the Tibet government as a radio monitor and trainer in 1947. Col Nepean died in 2002 at the age of 92. Recently an original QSL from AC4YN sold for \$1136 on eBay. That is the second highest recorded price for an old QSL - the record is held by a 1AW QSL at \$2125.

FARC has a general membership meeting with a program on the 2nd Monday of every month at the Red Cross building, 690 Coliseum Drive in Winston-Salem. The club conducts its main business meeting (sometimes called the Board Meeting) on the 3rd Monday generally at the same location. This is where most of the club's business is conducted and all attending members have a vote. All club members are strongly encouraged to attend the business meeting.
