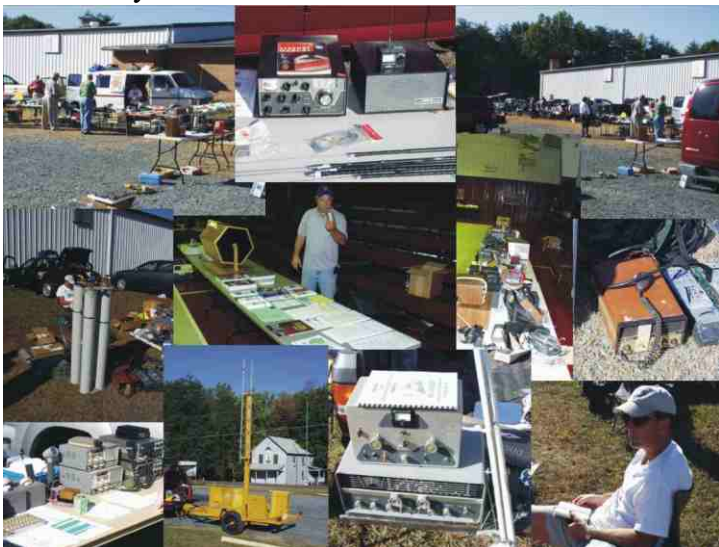

## CQWW returns to the FARC shack!

After 10 years of operating the CQWW SSB contest from downtown Winston-Salem and out at **Robert's KG4NEP** multi tower site, the contesting crew decided to do this year's event back in the club station. There were several reasons for this -

- Many thought that it would be fun to try it from a different venue, as our #2 finish in the USA last year represented sort of a "top out" in our category (there's a station in PA that we'll simply never beat due to geography issues).
- The FARC shack had become a bit worn down with old computers, and some of the antenna lines needing fixing. If we did CQWW from there this year we could give the shack a nice upgrade.
- **Raja KB6MTH** made a very generous donation to the club to purchase 2 new laptop computers and flat screen monitors which will make our Field Day operation easier and allows for quicker activation for disaster work.
- The club has had a slew of new members who have been interested in learning about contesting. We had talked about traveling to the mountain or beach for the contest, but since we have lots of folks wanting to try their hand at it, we figured doing it here would offer the most opportunity for everyone to see what HF contesting is like!
- This would give Robert a chance to shoot for a top finish as a single operator, the ultimate category for the top contesters in the world.

I wanted to take a bit to talk about how the club shack worked out this weekend for CQWW. It has been 10 years since we did a WW from there, and we sure did have a lot of fun. We even got several new contest operators interested! As of this writing the **W4NC** M/S operation is 8th US, **Robert's W4WS** SOHP effort is at 10th place US and **Tim AG4RZ** is in 1st place for QRP 15m!

Here is my list of notes in no particular order:

- Computers- they worked great. I need to put some RF chokes on the keyboard and mouse lines as well as the USB to serial adapters, but things worked beautifully. The Internet connection provided by the Red Cross was rock solid and we were one of about 25 stations that reported our scores in real

time to an Internet site. Cool. The Packet Point and shoot system in Writelog was great. We had 4 computers linked, and I'll work on getting the win2k machine into the mix so we have 3 computers at all time in there- 2 at the operating positions and one on the desk for showing grayline and propagation programs.

- We need 4 pl-259s put on the unused coax on the roof. Also, those coaxes need to be hung up off the roof and labeled so we can use them in the shack.
- The guy wires on the tower need tightening and we need to redress the coax going up to the tower with new cable ties and tape.
- We need to run coax to the VHF antenna- hardline would be great.
- After I replace the bad trap on our portable TH3 antenna, we should put it up on the tower fixed NE- with the option to turn it NW for domestic events like SS and NAQP. Having 2 yagis pointed towards EU is key to being successful in worldwide events. It would only be put up about 10-15 feet off the roof line so it won't add a lot of weight to the tower.
- The vertical on the roof needs to be adjusted on 15 meters (easy to do). We also need to get its coax off the roof and get some more radials down up there. The 80/160 sloper should be extended a bit to get its 80m resonance a bit lower within the new 80-meter band plan.
- The coax loop on the C4XL antenna was gone and I made a temporary repair. We'll need to make that repair permanent, including sealing some of the coax insulation that was stripped off the 40-meter coax. The rotor thrust bearing could use some grease.
- We took the opportunity to clean out and repack the closets. We now have all of our equipment packed up and ready to

dispense in the event of emergencies including tuners, coax jumpers, power supplies, rigs and headsets. The House chairman now has a clean space to store our sodas, coffee, etc. and the FD and Hamfest food boxes are stored below and ready to use.

●Radios- The Yaesu FT920 did a beautiful job and it is now housed where the Kenwood TS2000 was. The thought here was that the big rig should stay in the shack and the smaller more portable rig should go to Field day. Now to the gut wrenching part. While I think the TenTec Omni Six plus is a wonderful, classic rig, it is probably worth more to the TenTec fan than it is to us as DXers and Contestors. It does not hear nearly as well as the 920, does not perform split band functions, and has no audio monitor. It is simply old technology in an environment where noise reduction is essential (the Red Cross is a noisy RF environment. I would recommend that we sell the Omni 6 (and its associated cabling) and replace it with another 920 or 1000. We should keep the Titan amplifier, as it is a very useful piece. If we sell this properly we will end up putting a couple bucks in the treasury. We should offer it to club members first, before going to eBay or the TenTec reflector. The Heathkit SB220 amplifier, while very good on 80-20, is flat on 160, 15 and 10- a sure sign of both weak tubes and an output adjustment on the 160 circuitry. This amp also needs a permanent standby switch installed or incorporated into the voice keying boxes which worked great off the laptops. I'll have Gene make up a couple boxes for this purpose with associated cables for both the 920 and the FD radios (Icom 706 and TS2000)

I'll look into redressing the blue panels in the operating desk to clean up the appearance a bit.

That's about all I can think of. While it may sound like a lot, we are talking about a couple nice Saturday mornings this fall to complete everything. This shack is a real joy to operate from, and I am going to make a real effort to work many of the contests from there this season as a well as help others use it. With Robert's hugely successful station and the upgrade of W4NC, there's no reason or excuse not to get on the air this fall!

Congrats to everyone who helped out this weekend. We all made some real waves! (Bad pun noted.)

### Other CQWW Notes:

**Ed KU4BP** was able to operate some in between becoming a new homeowner and a new job that requires lots of travel. He had an inverted L (37 feet vertical and 30 feet horizontal with 22 radials fed with 175 feet of coax). No beverages up yet, maybe in November. He was using a Kenwood TS850 and 100 Watts.

From Ed's email: "Jumped in mainly for an antenna test on 40 and 80. Was quite surprised with the results as they were not as I was expecting. I was not heard on 40m at all. Managed one QSO with SV5 and that was a struggle to get him. Everyone else could not hear me at all. Especially VK6LK which would have been a new 40m zone for me. Even with the frequency clear he couldn't hear me. So 40m was a bitter disappointment after working a VK6 on 80m last year with a trapped vertical."

"80m was better because at least I was heard. Didn't get on till 0200z Sat night. Ran a little bit and netted some US and VE. Worked into the

Caribbean, Mexico, some Europe and coastal Africa. Still shocked over 40m though. Either conditions were very poor or I was skipping over them."

"Will run another test for SS next month. Not DX but a good antenna workout.

## SkyWarn Training for FARC Members

It has been about five years since FARC has held SkyWarn training and it is long overdue. After consulting with Michele Brock from WS/FC EM a plan has been reached to hold an extended SkyWarn training for both the public and FARC. The **January** Club meeting will be a basic SkyWarn training. Because of the extended program time there will be a short **FARC meeting at 7:00 - Not 7:30**. At 7:30 the SkyWarn training will start and continue to 9:30. The January training will cover winter weather primarily. Then again in **February** FARC will again meet at 7:00 and a second SkyWarn basic training session will begin at 7:30 and continue to 9:30. The February session will cover summer weather. Then again in **March** we will repeat the process: FARC will meet at 7:00 PM and an **Advanced** SkyWarn training will begin at 7:30 and continue to 9:30.

Why so much? First we have *never* offered the advanced course. Second, while they won't turn you away, you should have completed the basic training before taking the advanced course. The basic course covers so much material that it can't really be covered in one night. Completing either session will qualify you for the advanced training, plus you will have covered both winter and summer training.

After much discussion on both the FARC email reflector and at the October board meeting it was decided to go ahead with this rather unusual (for us) program. It is a service to the Public, a service to ham community and it will re-generate interest in the SkyWarn program. For those who would like to use W4NC the shack will be available but we encourage you to attend the training.

Those who complete either the January or February SkyWarn training (or both) will receive certificates of basic weather spotter training from the National Weather Service. Those who complete the March course will receive certificates of advanced weather spotter training from the NWS.

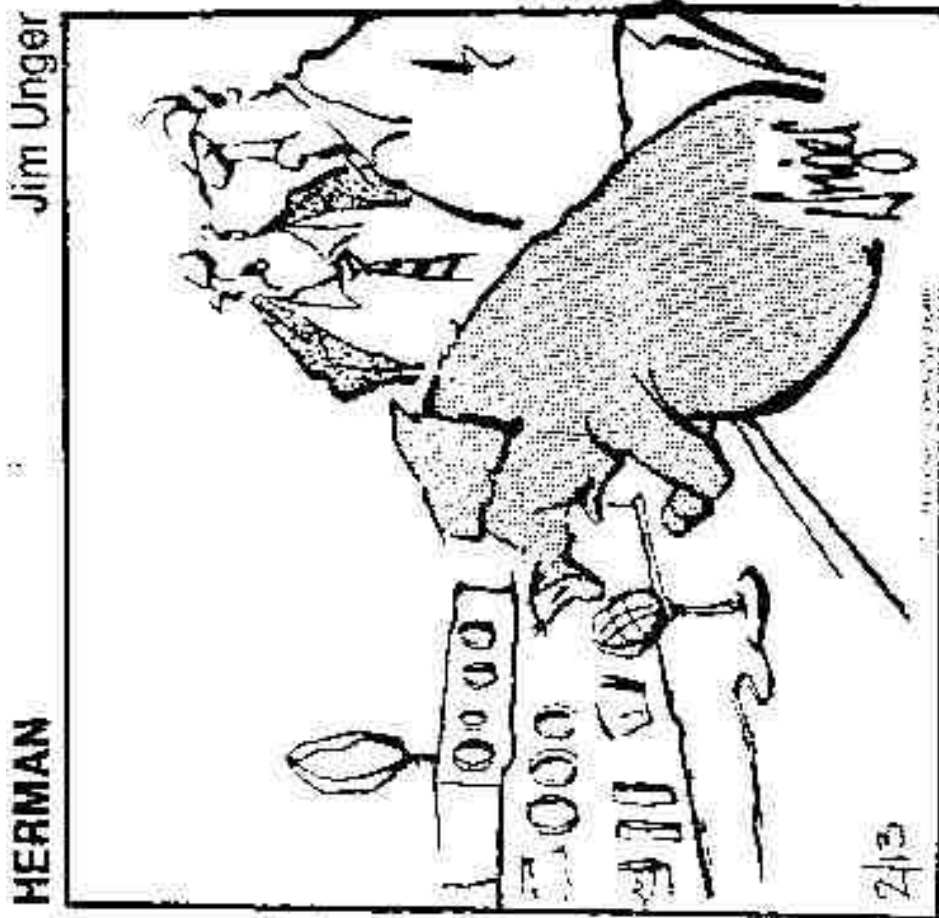
