Amateur Radio License Testing!

Amateur radio testing is available for new applicants as well as upgrades. Exams will be given the 2nd Monday of every month, except December, prior to the FARC regular meeting. The time is 6:30 PM and the place is the Red Cross building on 690 Coliseum Drive in Winston-Salem. Pre-registration is required via e-mail, listing the elements you wish to test for, your phone number and email address. Please note that candidates wishing to upgrade their license MUST bring:

- A) Their original license for viewing
- B) Two copies of their license, one of which Must be attached to their FCC Form 605.
- C) The Original CSCE and One Copy of their CSCE if they have one

For new hams, please complete the information on the FARC application (usually the last page of the Newsletter), if you have not already done so, for a free Membership to the Forsyth Amateur Radio Club (FARC). Mark the form "New Ham - Exam date". Once the form is completed, bring to the next club meeting, or please scan and email to me.

Exams are offered before the FARC meeting (2nd Monday at the Red Cross) and start at 6:30 PM in room 109 at the Red Cross building. You are Encouraged to arrive early at 6:20 PM

Preregistration is strongly suggested at info <at> w4nc <dot> com. We try to accommodate walk-ins if we can.

Our biggest challenge continues to be encouraging upgrade candidates to bring a copy of their license to exam sessions. Effective July 1, 2016, upgrade candidates forgetting copies of their license, will be dismissed and invited to bring their license copy to next month's exam session. A copy of your license must accompany the application to the FCC. Any missing copies unfortunately delays the entire license process for all exam candidates. Bring your original license, if you have one, two forms of ID, \$12.00 and successful completion forms (CSCE's-if any).

November Program Test Equipment

Thanks to all who texted or emailed me about the program. I hope I answered all the questions, but I'm not always "Johnnie-on-the-spot" about getting to all my emails quickly. If I missed something it was not intentional. OK, I admit it ran really long, but I did warn you. The slide presentation will be available in a week or so for those who requested it.

The main point is that new, and often fairly inexpensive equipment can be bought for not much more than some of the used gear that shows up at hamfests. Sometimes it even costs less and does more. Always go for quality if you can. but if your budget will not support it there really are options. Primarily plan ahead. If you try to do it all in one purchase they will not only be expensive but you will probably buy some of the wrong items. It pays to plan ahead.

If money is a problem and you are starting with little or nothing, first plan ahead. What is it that you want to accomplish? Map out your ideas and when you see something that meets your needs it may be time to pounce.

The usual first piece of equipment should be a good multimeter. On the high end of the standard meter, a Fluke 115 runs about \$180, shown at right. It includes a VoltSense function that will indicate if AC voltage is present without using probes. That is a "killer" application, if you'll pardon the pun.





The Fluke might be a budget buster but one of the cheap Chinese-made meters on eBay are an option. The VC97 runs about \$30, including shipping, shown at left. They are made by several manufacturers I believe, but they look alike, and the quality and accessories may vary. There are other models, this is just one I bought to see what they

are like. They do come over "on the sloooow boat" however so be warned. Usually 2 to 2 1/2 weeks, but perhaps as long as 5-6 weeks. Their end-point accuracy seems very good but their linearity may not be perfect, at least on the one I checked. That should not be a problem for almost everything ham related.

Used Fluke meters do often show up at hamfests but they don't last long. The Fluke 77 is getting a bit old now, I think I acquired my first in the late 1980s and it is still going strong. There are others, Beckman is one that is good. Frequently the current fuse (there are usually two) may be blown. All meters require great care on the current scale. Basically be careful with any Continued on the next page

used meter but current scales are not used often so even if it is bad the meter might be a bargain. Both the Fluke 117 and the VC97 come with capacitance and frequency counter functions. The VC97 adds hfe (transistors) and temperature along with a thermocouple so that might be a plus.





There is still a need for analog meters for many purposes, mainly when you try to peak or null a circuit, a digital meter can be vexing to read peaks and nulls. Setting amplifier bias currents are also a good use and using a digital meter here may make you pickier than you need to be. Almost any old VTVM is

good for peak and nulls - you just want to see that the signal is about the range needed. Among the best of the old VTVMS is the B&K (my opinion) shown at the top above, but RCA Volt-Ohmyst are as good, or better and popular. One version of the RCA is shown at left, there were several models, all just about as good but the later ones would be preferred. Even the Heathkits and Eicos are usually very serviceable. Two versions of the Heathkit are shown below.





The Simpson 260 multimeter is a workhouse and is still the portable analog meter standard, and it is still made. Some version of this meter has been in production for at least 65 years. Check www.simpson260.com for information. Collectors may make the hamfest ones seem pricey. If you are serious about getting one, try to see the



inside and also check for function. Battery corrosion can be a big killer. Also mechanical and electrical abuse may have damaged either the circuitry or the meter and it may not be obvious so be careful.

Speciality items here would be a tweezer meter for SMD work and any of the various "pen" type meters. Both use the little round silver batteries so if you have one you might want to stock up on replacement batteries. My favorite tweezer meter is shown at the top of the next column.







Modern bench meters are a little on the luxury side but used ones are often available at a decent price. If you have the money go with Rigol for a new meter but they start around \$470. Above is the basic Rigol bench meter. On the used side are all kinds of HP, B&K, Fluke and other meters. Newer is of course better, but many bargains show up with these. I have bought used older Fluke bench meters for as little as \$20. Many have internal batteries, generally NiCads in the older meters and you will almost certainly have to replace them. If you can live without the battery capability they can be a good deal, but buying new batteries will run your costs upwards of a new handheld. Be very careful replacing NiCads with different batteries, especially lithium because charging circuits are different. The fire hazzard is real. If you do replace the batteries disable the older charging circuits. As with any used gear, check for function if you can first. By all means, if you have money to burn go with a new Keysight meter but you are in the kilo-dollar range and up.

Yes there are other options, these are the main ones that came to mind while I was preparing this. Next month I will try to cover another test equipment area.









Samuel F.B. Morse's 'Gallery of the Louvre' and the Art of Invention

EXHIBITION DATES: Friday, February 17, 2017 - Sunday, June 4, 2017

Reynolda House Museum of American Art will welcome an American masterwork for this exhibition, Samuel F.B. Morse's Gallery of the Louvre (1831–33). Created when the artist was living and working in Paris, the painting represents the famed Salon Carée in the Musée du Louvre. Morse spent months painting in the Louvre. Rather than faithfully representing the paintings that were hanging in the gallery, however, Morse

carefully curated his ideal installation. He walked the halls of the museum, selecting Old Master paintings for his composition, then painstakingly copied the paintings and "installed" them in the virtual gallery. He also included several figures, including himself, in the center, instructing a young woman, and his good friend James Fenimore Cooper, the American writer, shown with his family. The resulting monumental canvas—six feet by nine feet—was both an example of Morse's erudition and skill and a tool of instruction for American viewers who did not have access to Renaissance and Baroque paintings.

Morse, highly curious and well educated, was as interested in science and literature as he was in art. While returning to United States by ship in 1832, he conceived the idea for the machine that would become the telegraph, even making a crude prototype on board. From then on, technological inventions would occupy him more than art. The disappointing public reception of the Gallery of the Louvre in New York and Connecticut likely contributed to his decision to abandon painting. Today, the painting is recognized as a key work in the development of American art.

In many ways, however, the painting and the telegraph demonstrate Morse's interest in a single subject: the transmission of knowledge. Morse created the Gallery of the Louvre to instruct American audiences about important works of art. He created the telegraph to communicate information quickly and across great distances. The painting thus serves as a bridge between old modes of communication and new technological tools that heralded the information age. The painting also addresses complex themes such as the relationship between art and science, literature and theater, geography and mapping, artistic practice and the establishment of the canon, invention and technology, and religion. Reynolda's exhibition of the painting, called Samuel F.B. Morse's Gallery of the Louvre and the Art of Invention, will include Morse's epic painting, as well as early telegraph machines, books, and prints to explore these themes as well as to consider the history of the transmission of information.

On November 30, Twain's actual birthday, the Mark Twain House and Museum in Hartford, Connecticut has granted permission for a special event station to be set up in the front yard of the house from 9 AM until 4 PM EST (1400-2100 UTC).

Born in Missouri in 1835, Twain lived in Hartford from 1874 to 1891 and wrote many of his greatest works during that time, including The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, Adventures of Huckleberry Finn, and A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court.

"We are so excited to have our neighbors at ARRL with us on Mark Twain's 181st birthday!" said Betsy Maguire, Manager of Living History at the Mark Twain House and Museum. "This is a rare treat for the Museum staff, our visitors and, hopefully, many amateur operators across the country who make contact with the station. As a lover of the science and technology of his day, Samuel Clemens would definitely approve of a 'special event station' on the grounds of 'the loveliest home that ever was."

W1T activity on November 30 will be exclusively from the Mark Twain House and Museum; all other W1T activity during the week will be conducted from other sites, as ARRL staff time permits. All bands and modes will be considered, including satellite operation. A special W1T QSL card will be available to commemorate the event. How About a Monthly Quiz Instead?



NC stations work out-of-state contacts one time per band and mode. Others outside of NC work in-state contacts once per county, band and mode. (You may work a station on 20CW and again on 40CW, for example.) Club, Expedition and Mobile operations are allowed (and encouraged!). There are separate categories for QRP, Low, and HIgh power.

One of our perennial bonus stations is NI4BK. Ever wonder what it's like to operate from the Battleship North Carolina? Here's a link you might enjoy:



ARRL once again is calling on its members to urge their US Senators to support the Amateur Radio Parity Act (H.R. 1301) when it comes up in the Senate during the "lame duck" session of Congress that adjourns in mid-December. The House of Representatives approved the bill in September, but if the Senate does not follow suit, the bill will die, and the entire process will have to be repeated. ARRL Hudson Division Director Mike Lisenco, N2YBB, who chairs the ARRL Board's Legislative Advocacy Committee and has been heavily involved in efforts to move H.R. 1301 forward, said today, "The clock is ticking!"

QSL Blast from the Past

This month is something a little different than a QSL, the NCQSO party got me to thinking about a different ship. Years ago I was in California for a business trip. I and two others, non-hams, played hooky one day and went looking for the sights. We came upon the Queen Mary, now an exhibit and bought tickets for a tour. I insisted that we had to find the radio room, not knowing it was even accessible. My co-workers were less enthused. Wow! Not only was it open but it was in operation. Not by commercial operators but by members of the Associated Radio Amateurs of Long Beach. <u>IF</u> you had a copy of your ham license with you operation was allowed and if a minimum number of contacts were made then you would (eventually) receive a certificate in the mail. I dug into my wallet and was so glad to find a license copy, stashed there long ago with the thought it might be useful one day. While my co-workers waited, somewhat impatiently, I made the required number of contacts. Reproduced here is a copy of my certificate.

As a teenager I thought the job of shipboard radio operator would be THE dream job. Sadly that didn't happen, partly because my CW skills then were not up to that level. Even today, they aren't. Plus I had other interests. And it was probably a good thing as technology slowly did away with both that job and the prestige that went with it. But it was a nice dream of a life far away and visiting distant ports. I suppose the day-to-day was actually a little more drudgery than the dream suggested. But still...

A picture of the radio room is shown below and is very much like I remember it. Operation was a thrill and dreams of long ago came back.

The RMS Queen Mary sailed the North Atlantic from 1936 to 1967. She was the flagship of the Cunard-White Star Line until she was replaced by the Queen Elizabeth in 1946. In the 1930s she and the Normandie competed for the fastest ship title averaging speeds in excess of 30 knots. By the 1960s not only was she too expensive to renovate, she was too expensive to operate and she retired to Long Beach, California.

She is a beautiful ship and recalls the glory days of the weeklong sail from England to the US and a world that moved a little slower and with more style and luxury than today. The design is mostly Art Deco and is very much like pre-WW1 ships, a criticism

of the day, but in my mind a plus now. There is a mural aboard that shows the two main routes, summer and winter. The winter route was moved more to the south to miss icebergs, a good idea after April, 1912. The radio call was GBTT.

Sadly Nate Brightman, K6OSC, called the "spark" behind W6RO, the Amateur Radio station aboard the Queen Mary in Long Beach, California, died on October 29. He was 99. Thank you Nate for what you didoperating W6RO was a great experience.

She operates today as a hotel (yes, you can stay aboard), as a museum and the radio room is still in operation on certain days. Should you find yourself in Long Beach, go visit her. Better yet, go to Wilmington and visit the Battleship North Carolina first. The Battleship North Carolina is a different experience and certainly less luxurious and less panache, but she is closer and the Azalea Coast Radio Club will thank you for it.





Amateur Radio Parity Act

On September 13th, ARRL members received the following email (slightly edited) from our Division Leaders, Dr. Jim N2ZZ and Bill N2COP: "...Amateur Radio needs your help. Please take a few minutes to read through this entire email, which will shape the future of Ham Radio. This past Monday, an important first step in antenna relief took place as the US House of Representatives passed HR 1301 The Amateur Radio Parity Act. The bill now goes to the US Senate for a vote, and that's where we need your help. By now you should have received an email from ARRL asking for you to click on a safe hyperlink and enter your zip code, which will automatically send letters to your state's two U.S. Senators asking for their vote for the Parity Act. If HR 1301 passes the Senate, it will then go to the President for his signature and will become law.

Please help us in the effort. It takes only a few minutes. Please go to this linked website and follow the prompts:

https://arrl.rallycongress.net/ctas/urge-senate-to-support-amateur-radio-parity-act

As elected officials of the ARRL, we are permitted only reach out to Members. However, the use of this Rally Congress web link can be used by anyone who desires to support this legislation. This is the first federal antenna relief measure in 31 years since the FCC issued the PRB-1 ruling. If it becomes law, the Amateur Radio Parity Act will permit licensed Amateur Radio operators to set up an effective outdoor antenna in neighborhoods and subdivisions with antenna restrictions. Trade industry data suggest that up to half of all Hams live in Home Owner Association (HOA) regulated housing. Furthermore, upwards of three out of four new housing units are covered by homeowner restrictions. Antenna restrictions have been an impediment to operation for many radio operators, so please take a few minutes now to

generate letters to your U.S. Senators in support of HR1301.

Remember who will benefit from this legislation, in addition to those that are currently impacted: 1) older Hams who downsize or relocate to smaller housing; 2) operators who move into assisted living facilities; 3) Hams who move into HOA restricted neighborhoods to take care of an aging or disabled individual; 4) working or military Hams who are in short term housing; 5) youth who get an interest in Amateur Radio and want to become licensed; and, 6) emergency communicators who can provide vital neighborhood links with responders and government agencies. While you may not be currently impacted by antenna restrictions, hundreds of thousands of Hams are. Unless they get a chance to get on the air, the number of licensed operators will diminish, and with that the possible future of our hobby and public service. **Every ARRL member needs to contact their** US Senators now -PLEASE! ... Our thanks to the overwhelming number of ARRL members who contacted their US House Representatives to help get HR 1301 passed!



Hara Arena, Home of Dayton Hamvention Closes

OK, let's get it out of the way - we all hated Hara Arena - it was old, poorly laid out, poorly maintained and (at least one year) a sewer. But it was our place we loved to hate. The Hara Arena is closing and going away. Even with its deficiencies, it had a ceratin allure to those of us who had been there year after year. The Hamvention must move.

The Dayton ARC has announced that the Hamvention will move to the Greene County Fairgrounds in Xenia, Ohio. In the two maps shown here to the same scale it is obvious that the Fairgrounds is a much bigger place with lots of open green space. Paved parking might be an issue but I expect a lot of that open green space will be used for parking, and hopefully for fleamarket.



Hara Arena is the large paved spot in the middle of picture. Most of the area around Hara is other businesses, but the grassy fields were used for parking.

Those of us who stay at University of Dayton will see little difference in travel, I expect, since Google Maps puts the time to Hara Arena as 21 minutes and to Green County Fairgrounds as 24 minutes. It is longer but better roads and not through town traffic (mostly). Your actual mileage may vary. We'll see.

As to the Hamvention itself there will be some adjustment pains. There is less commercial space and some of that will be covered cattle barns with concrete floors but no AC. Since it is in May that may or may not be issue. Some years it has been cool and below 40 degrees, some years it has been hotter than a late summer jalapeño.

The buildings are all nearly new, so that is a plus. Sadly Xenia was hit by tornados, most recently in 2000, but that has resulted in all new buildings at the Fairgrounds. How the fleamarket area will be split up is not clear yet.

The Dayton (now Xenia?) Hamvention is a major event. It draws 25,000+ attendees from at least 60 countries. It is estimated to bring about \$18,000,000 in revenue to the area. Major ham manufacturers usually announce their new products there. The fleamarket is without comparison. If you walk all the rows you moved so fast that you can not see everything, especially in the fleamarket where the best goodies usually require some digging.

The Greene County fairgrounds take up most of the area below. Lots of grassy areas



Our group that goes up each year is usually limited to 12, although we have discussed doubling that and hiring a professional driver and a bus (see page 10). It is up for discussion. The costs for the trip will probably be under \$300 (maybe closer to \$260) for a place to stay, tickets and a sitting spot in our booth. That is an estimate, not a firm price. Basically all but food. Payment would be due in February or before - so by the time May is here it is paid for. The decision on how this will unfold is still open but will have to be finalized by the middle of December. If we stay with the 12 probably all spots are full - we already have 20+ requests for the bigger group of 24. We'll see what happens. If you are seriously interested see Henry Heidtmann at one of the club meetings and soon - as we have to commit on rooms as soon as they are available.

MOMENTUM BUILDING TO URGE SENATE PASSAGE OF THE AMATEUR RADIO PARITY ACT - The response to ARRL's call to action urging the support of US Senators for the Amateur Radio Parity Act, H.R. 1301, has been gratifying — although the campaign continues. But, that does not mean ARRL Members should take a break – your help is still needed!
